

Coming up at 2 pm, it's this month's Board of Health Meeting. This is what's on the agenda for November:



It looks like Guelph Councillor Rodrigo Goller is chairing today. He has called the meeting to order.

Sorry, having extreme technical difficulties joining the meeting. Please stand by.

Medical Officer of Health update: Dr. Mercer says that there's presently no RSV vaccine for children, but she believes that one will be available by this time next year. She also notes that this Radon Action Month! https://wdgpublichealth.ca/your-home/radon-testing

Busttil asks about if there's a requirement to do radon tests. Mercer says it's not a requirement in Ontario to have your basement tested, but some places in Canada have made it a requirement when selling your home.

Busuttil notes that it's an area of concern with the City encouraging accessory units like basement apartments. Mercer notes that if someone is sleeping in the basement, you should be especially aware of the risk b/c that's where radon gathers.

Gardhouse asks about people with persistent coughs, should they hold off getting vaxxed? Mercer says if you're feeling well with no fever, then you're probably fine to get your shot. If you think you hade COVID and didn't test, you're safe to get the shot.

If you did confirm with a test that you had COVID recently, you're probably good to wait for a few months, or even until next year.

Caton asks if there's any accommodation for high risk people under 60 to get the RSV vaccine. Mercer says there's nothing stopping a doctor from doing a risk assessment (off label), but

presently it's just approved for 60+. Next, two items on the consent agenda:

Next, Client and Community Support. Lisa Hebden, Manager of Client and Community Support all present. Mercer says she's excited about this report.

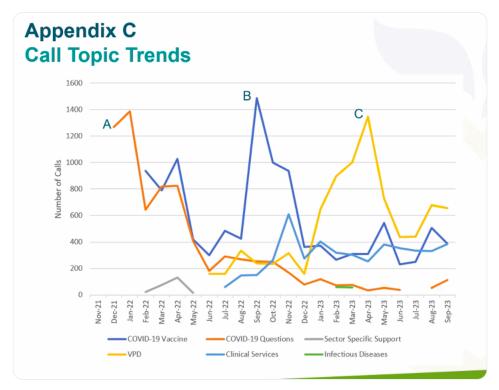
Actually, Katrina Arellano one of the nurses at Public Health will present. This is how CCS works:



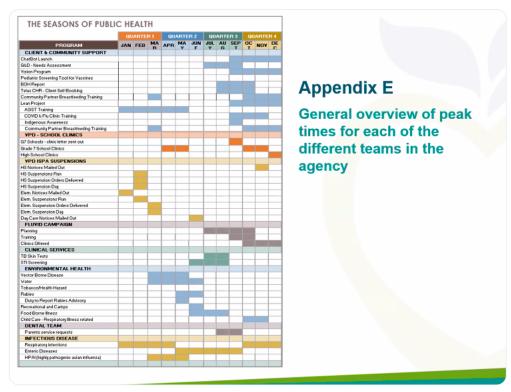
The CCS has grown from its original function, which was as the COVID-19 call centre, to be a reference for all types of public health questions.

That information helped inform what the "seasons" of public health are, the times of year where the public health office is seeing demand for specific services or questions.



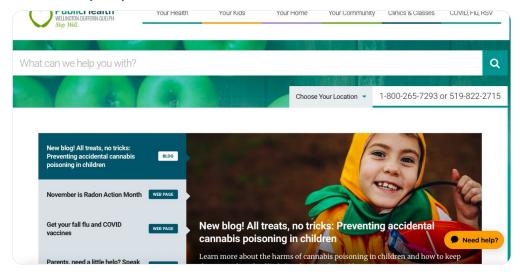
The Chatbot is one of the innovations created from the changes to the CCS, it's available 24/7 and it helps people find info online anytime in an easy and accessible way.

Mercer adds that staff are constantly strengthening both the questions and the answer functions on the chatbot and it always leads back to a live nurse so there is oversight.

Manktelow asks about how to access to the chatbot. It's the orange button at the bottom right of the screen when you go to the WDG homepage. Covers about 52 topics right now, and Hebden says they see a lot of use outside normal biz hours.



Busuttil asks about tech to book appointments for seniors, sometimes they can't fill out their info to book an appointment before they loose the slot. Rita Isley head nurse says there's always a prompt to get help if people are stuck filling out online.

Hebden adds that they also work with CCS to book appointments for families since there is a gap in the system trying to book multiple appointments. Caton says this tripped her up trying to book a shot for them and their daughter.

Caton asks about parent groups that are sharing information about health matters. Mercer says the comms team is very active on many of those groups and are able to jump in and

provide insight. Hebden adds their active with own FB page too.

Anderson notes that there are so many seniors in rural areas that don't have laptops or smart phones, need to stay on top of old-fashioned comms too. Isley says every campaign that focuses on seniors comes with a print version incl. newspaper ads.

Mercer adds that they recognise that while the world's changed, there's still a broad audience that needs to be served. They're keenly aware that there are multiple points of communication, including Dr Mercer's weekly appearance on CTV K-W Thursdays.

Motion to receive the report for information approved unanimously.

Next, question from Caton about Immunization Coverage in Schools and Licensed Childcare Settings, What's the process for submitting immunisation details? Isley says there's a link on the website to update record, or submit info by phone, mail or in-person.

Caton asks if there are any materials for new Canadians or returning residents who have different vaccine schedules. Isley says there's different skeds across Canada even, so they can work with the family to meet the requirements.

Motion to receive the report on Immunization Coverage in Schools and Licensed Childcare Settings is approved.

Finance + Audit Committee Reports with committee chair Chris White. First report is the Annual Facilities Update, which looks at the repairs and changes to the two facilities WDGPH own and the one that they rent.

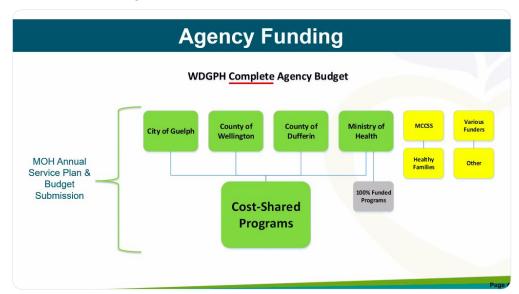
The Annual Facilities Update is received for information.

Those reports are approved.

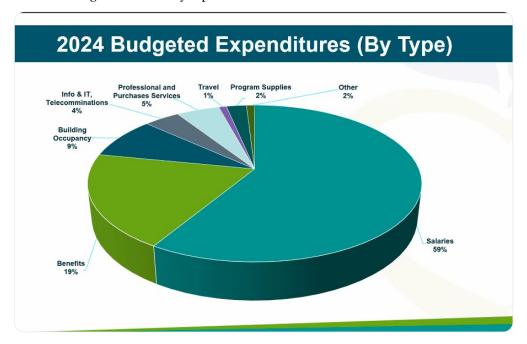
Next, 2024 Draft Budget. David Kingma, Director of Administrative Services & CAO presents.

Let's look at the funding structure:



Worth noting: 2023 will likely be the last year for the COVID-19 reimbursement from the provincial government.

Here's the budget breakdown by expenditure areas:



Here's the changes in the cost shared budget, meaning services that are not 100% covered by a provincial ministry. Kingma says that a 1% increase is expected for next year, and that ONgov is aware of pressures on PHs.

For municipalities, there's a 2.6 per cent year-over-year increase for 2024, and that has been communicated to the finance offices at the various partner municipalities.

High level summery:

Summary

- Ministry base increase of 1%
- Municipal base request for funding increase is set at 2.6% overall
- Salary increase of 3.75% for most employee groups in 2024 (New four year contract with ONA Union 2024 3.75%, 2025 3%, 2026 3.25%, 2027 3%)
- Non-statutory benefit rates increase April 1, 2024 based on projections provided by Mosey and Mosey (e.g. Medical 2.1% - 7.6%, LTD 2.4% - 11.3%)
- Increase in IT subscriptions, licensing fees, phone service fees, laptops (+27%)
- COVID-19 costs above and beyond our budget are captured separately and submitted to the Ministry of Health for reimbursement

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Areas of risk? Inflation (obviously) and minimal changes to the provincial funding for the long-term.

White thanks Kingma and his team and says the 2.6% is a responsible ask given the pressures municipalities are facing.

Manktelow asks about the \$300k being taken from reserves. Kingma says that was done so that they can get to a balanced budget, and it's likely they won't have to make that transfer with gapping and savings, but optically, ONgov needs to see funding is strained.

Kingma notes that the buildings will be paid off by the third quarter of next year, which might lossen things up, but things are looking tight again by the time 2027 rolls around.

Anderson says he doesn't think municipalities will have an issue with the increase because they know the value for money.

Draft budget approved unanimously.

The board will now move into closed session on a couple of topics.
